Pacem is a musical expression of humankind's desire for universal peace among all people, as well as the personal peace that comes from within.

“Pacem” is the Latin word for “peace.” The choice of Latin is significant for two reasons: 1) as a kind of tribute to the to the beautiful, imitative motet style of the Renaissance composers I admire, such as Josquin Des Prez and Palestrina, and 2) as a symbol of the universality of humankind’s desire for peace -- a collective desire that crosses geographic, religious, ethnic, historical, or other boundaries. The reflective, more peaceful moments in the work represent our hope for personal peace, while the stronger, *maestoso* statements of the main theme convey a hopeful optimism for the realization of a lasting universal peace. Other statements are more conflicted and ambiguous and remind us that achieving universal peace requires justice, persistence and struggle, and that justice and peace remain as unrealized challenges in the world.
